"PILOT SPEAK"

Call most any airport and the person who answers the telephone will most likely refer to a sheet of answers to frequently asked questions, handily located next to the telephone. However, if you ask a more specific pilot-related question, they will typically put you on hold and search for someone to answer your operational questions.

Not so here! There's better than a 50/50 chance that the person who answers the phone will be a pilot. Everyone who works in the airport office is a pilot and additional pilots can be found on-duty in the airport fire and airfield maintenance departments. Our five pilots collectively have more than 105 years of pilot experience and much of it was obtained right here at this airport.

The director, Bob McDaniel, learned to fly at this airport more than 46 years ago and has been flying ever since. Amy Clements, an 8-year pilot, serves as the airport's office manager and earned her private pilot's license while attending Parks College.

Like Bob, Diane Earhart, the part-time administrative assistant, soloed on her 16th birthday and has been flying airplanes and controlling air traffic in our tower ever since. Diane holds her commercial pilot and flight instructor certificates with multi-engine and instrument ratings and has been flying for 40 years.

Airport firefighter and airfield maintenance technician Chad Trost earned his private pilot's

license more than 6 years ago and our newest pilot, Danny Adams, earned his commercial pilot's license with multi-engine and instrument ratings and has been flying for 4 years. Danny is currently working as an airport maintenance technician and is hoping to become an Air Force pilot later this year.

You don't have to be a pilot to run an airport, but the experience definitely helps.

Our non-pilot employees are not without a significant amount of aviation experience, either. Bobby Toenjes leads our airport maintenance team and has been working at this airport for more than 30 years now. After adding in Val, Kenny, and Dan's time here and our aircraft rescue and firefighters' experience, our non-pilots add another 83 years' of airport experience, bringing the staff's total aviation experience level up to 188 years. That combined level of experience is almost unheard of at most airports around the country.

NEW 120' OBSTRUCTION ON THE AIRPORT

An FAA contractor is erecting a new ADS-B ground antenna adjacent to the northwest corner of the Parks College parking lot. This new lighted obstruction will be 120 feet tall (550 feet MSL.)

The antenna is part of the FAA's Next Generation Air Transportation System (NextGen) ground infrastructure. The ADS-B ground antenna will receive data from the air traffic control system and aircraft position information transmitted from ADS-B equipped aircraft and retransmit it to controller screens and cockpit displays on aircraft equipped with ADS-B In avionics.

More than 800 of these antennae are being erected at airports around the nation during 2013. While their locations avoid runway approach and departure paths, they can be troublesome for helicopter pilots and others who stray from the normal takeoff and landing paths. Use caution for these new obstructions as it will take several months for them to show up on airfield diagrams and instrument approach plates.

JET AVIATION HAS DELIVERED 200 "GREEN" AIRCRAFT

Jet Aviation St. Louis recently delivered its 200th "green" completion aircraft. They are called "green" aircraft because they arrive unfinished from the factory with only some surfaces covered with green primer paint. These aircraft roll off the assembly line and fly here without exterior paint or interior finishings. They are basically an empty fuselage with only temporary seats for the pilots.

The new owner sits down with Jet Aviation's talented designers to design the aircraft's exterior paint scheme and interior fabrics and furnishings. If you can dream it, they can build it. Once the aircraft is complete, the new owner takes delivery of their shiny new custom aircraft right here on Jet Aviation's ramp.

With the 16 most recent aircraft delivered ahead of schedule, Jet Aviation St. Louis has developed proven systems for building highly-customized aircraft in an efficient way. The company has implemented 5S and Lean technologies and established a Continuous Improvement department.
